**Thomas Chapel, MA, MBA**, is a Senior Health Scientist in the Office of the Director, Office of Strategy and Innovation at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. His primary responsibility is to help build the capacity of CDC and its programs by: helping them with strategic planning and evaluation design; building networks on evaluation and planning across CDC's many programs; and providing a range of training and facilitation services in strategic planning and evaluation design. He is a frequent and well-known speaker and presenter on the topics of strategic planning and evaluation, presenting at many national conferences, meetings, and grantee conferences each year. He is a well-respected facilitator both within and outside of CDC; each year helping 20-30 organizations think through issues, choices, and plans in evaluation and/or strategic planning. He has authored several articles and contributed chapters to several edited volumes on evaluation, including, most recently, the *New Directions in Evaluation* series (Jossey-Bass) and publications for Oxford University Press.

Before joining CDC in 2000, Mr. Chapel served since 1988 as Project Manager and, later, Vice-President of the Atlanta office of ORC Macro where he directed and managed more than 100 projects in program evaluation, strategic planning, and evaluation design for public and non-profit organizations; taught courses and trainings in evaluation and strategic planning; and facilitated national meetings and expert panels on a host of public health and evaluation topics.

He is active in the local affiliate of the American Evaluation Association (AEA), currently as Past-President and formerly as President and as Chair of the Professional Development Committee. He oversees a joint program with the local United Way to build evaluation capacity of local community-based organizations by linking them with volunteer evaluators and planners. He has authored several articles and contributed chapters to several edited volumes on evaluation, including, most recently the *New Directions in Evaluation* series, and the a chapter on logic modeling in *Evidence Based Practice Manual: Research and Outcome Measures in Health and Human Services* (Oxford Press, 2004). Mr. Chapel holds a BA degree from Johns Hopkins University and MA in public policy and MBA degrees from the University of Minnesota.
